

"Addressing Forgotten Standards With Your Ensembles: Composition, Improvisation and <u>Music History</u>" (p. 27)

A complete, well-rounded music education may seem comprehensive if your ensemble is receiving Superior "I" ratings, but the National Standards for Arts Education and newly developed National Core Music Standards deem performing, responding and creating worthy of exploration within your curricula. The highly neglected elements of our student's music education in the ensemble setting are composition, improvisation and music history. The question is: How do I find the time? Many obstacles exist to keep teachers from tackling these important standards; therefore, simple and easy projects will be presented to address composition, improvisation and music history while crossing into other curricula, such as Technology, Language Arts, Speech and History. An update on the current revisions of the National Core Music Standards will be presented, along with implementation suggestions for your district's assessment, differentiation, project-based learning and instructional strategies needs.

His most recent CD is "4" on Jazz Compass with Clay Jenkins, Gary Hobbs and Reggie Thomas.

"How to Get Your Guitarist from Eddie to Freddie" (p.36)

### "Rehearse As You Are: Enjoy the Round" (p.41)

His work has been published in The Instrumentalist and Teaching Music, and he is a research associate and writer for 8 volumes in the series Teaching Music Through Performance in Band.

At Webster, "Dr. P." conducts the Chamber Singers, Concert Choir, teaches courses in music education philosophy, choral conducting and literature, and advises undergraduate and graduate students in music education and choral conducting. Mike has also served as MMEA College/University Vice-President, and is currently the Technology Advisor for the organization. For the past seven years, Mike has served the national Percussive Arts Society as the chair of the Drum Set Committee. In the late 1980s and through the 1990s, Dr. Sekelsky performed frequently with many Kansas City area big bands including the Boulevard Big Band, the Little Boulevard Band, the Trilogy Big Band and the Jimmy Dorsey Orchestra.

Dr. Sekelsky appears frequently as a drum set clinician, most recently at the Missouri Days of Percussion in 2011 and 2013. He recently provided updates to the MOAJE Jazz Drum Set Grooves pdf required for All-State Jazz auditions, and videotaped the grooves which are available from his UCM profile page. He serves as an educational endorser for Evans drum heads, Sabian Cymbals, Vic Firth Sticks and Mallets, and represents TreeHouse Drums from Topeka Kansas.

#### "Decoding the Jazz Band Drum Chart" (p. 26)

This clinic will assist jazz band directors with language that will allow young drummers to use their concert and marching band knowledge to better understand their role as a jazz band drummer and allow them to read big band drum charts effectively.

Al Sergel retired from full time teaching in 2004 after 37 years, serving the last 23 years as Director of Bands at Northwest Missouri State University. Prior to NWMSU he directed very successful band programs in Florida and Texas. He has taught band at every level and today remains active as a conductor clinician, composer and adjudicator. His percussion solos and ensembles are published with JPM Music. Many are on the MSHSAA state graded music list. Sergel3 Music publishes his educational Warm-up Chorales, Tone-Time-Technique Exercises and Tetra Teaching 4 Technique. Sergel is the recipient of Distinguished Service to Music Award, A Orpheus Award, Distinguished Member Award, Florida State Band Alumni "Wall of Fame" Inductee and 2013 NWMSU Outstanding Faculty Emeritus Award. Currently he conducts the Platte City Community Band, serves as a Festival Manager for Music in the Parks, assists with managing the MSHSAA State Solo & Ensemble Festival and teaches part-time at Missouri Western State University.

#### "Tetra Teaching 4 Techniques" (p. 24)

Learning and mastering scales and arpeggios is an important aspect of instrumental musical development. In almost all auditions and chair placements, from the beginning to collegiate level, scales and arpeggios are part of the requirements and process. Tetra Teaching 4 Technique introduces scales through a 4-note process or "tetra-scale." This 4 note tetra-scale will allow students to acquire all the scales and arpeggios with ease and increase their interest in building technical facility.

**Dr. David L. Sharlow** in his fourth year as Director of Choral Activities and Assistant Professor of Music at Missouri Southern State University (MSSU) in Joplin, Missouri. A native Kansan, Dr. Sharlow received his Ph.D. in Music Education and Curriculum & Instruction from the University of Missouri Kansas City. Prior to his doctoral work, Dr. Sharlow enjoyed 12 years as a high school vocal music teacher; most notably in the Wichita, Kansas area. He also holds a Master's degree in Music Education from Wichita State University

and a Bachelor's degree in Music Education from Friends University. Prior to coming to MSSU, Dr. Sharlow was Interim Director of Choral Activities at the University of South Dakota, in Vermillion and Assistant Professor of Vocal Music Education at Northeastern Illinois University in Chicago. Dr. Sharlow's research revolves around the psychological, sociological and anthropological aspects of the music ensemble – specifically focusing on the value of individual achievement and its effect on the success of the ensemble in terms of reading, technique, and performance–through Epistemic, Pluralistic and Utopian pedagogies. Dr. Sharlow enjoys the opportunities to work with students of all ages and backgrounds and is a regular adjudicator with the WorldStrides Heritage Performance Programs based in Salt Lake City, Utah. He also has been fortunate to work with inspiring high school students as a festival clinician for honor choirs in Missouri, South Dakota, Kansas, Illinois, South Carolina and Florida. In his free time Dr. Sharlow enjoys spending time with his three wonderful children – Jon, Chris and Mikala, in addition to riding his much loved Harley Davidson Street Bob.

"Building Community- Establishing Relationships with Your Local Community Through the Process of Educating, Involving and Inspiring" (p. 33)

This short presentation will focus on how to effectively build community support for your program through the means of educating, involving and inspiring. Through the means of education we teach our community the how, what and why of the program, which informs, instructs and illuminates the community. Through the means of involving we include our community in the act of music making, which strengthens the bonds between the program and the community. Through the means of inspiring we allow for ardent experiences within the community, which generates the will, desire and want for support of the program on the part of the community.

**Kim Shelley** received her Bachelors and Masters degrees in Music Performance from the St. Louis Conservatory & School for the Arts, plus a Bachelors of Music Education degree from Northern Arizona University. Her former teachers include Richard Holmes, John Kasica and Thomas Stubbs. Ms. Shelley started performing with the St. Louis Symphony Orchestra at the age of nineteen years old, and subsequently recorded over thirty selections of music under the Telarc and RCA labels. She also has performed as Principal Timpanist/ Percussionist with the San Francisco Symphony, Minnesota Symphony, Summit Brass Ensemble, Monarch Brass Ensemble, Opera Theater of St. Louis, Illinois Symphony and Illinois Chamber Orchestra.

Ms. Shelley has given master classes at the Iowa Day of Percussion, Missouri Music Educators Association and the St. Louis Day of Percussion. She has also served as Treasurer for the Missouri Chapter of the Percussive Arts Society. Ms. Shelley is currently a member of Phi Beta Mu, Missouri Percussive Arts Society, MMEA, MBA and Missouri National Education Association.

#### "What's Up With Apps?" (p. 29)

Topics will include technological information about using both iPad & iPhone/Smartphone Apps available for music curriculum. Musicians everywhere are finding new apps for music creativity & performance utilizing the iDevices. How can we, the music educators, incorporate app's into our curriculum? This clinic will provide music educators with ideas on what apps are available in addition to ideas of how to use these apps in the classroom. **Wendy L. Sims**, Professor, Director of Music Education, and Director of Teacher Education at the University of Missouri-Columbia, holds bachelor and master's degrees from Kent State University and the Ph.D. from Florida State University. She is an award-winning teacher, specializing in early childhood/ elementary music education and research. Sims has authored numerous articles published in national and international journals, and is the editor of two books about music in early childhood. She regularly presents research and workshop sessions at national and international conferences, and is currently editor of The Journal of Research in Music Education. Sims is the MMEA Research Chair, has held offices in NAfME's Society for Research in Music Education, and has served as a member of the Board of Directors of the International Society for Music Education.

"Biting Into the Core: What Missouri Elementary Music Teachers Need to Know" (p.27)

Exploration of how the Common Core standards relate to Show-Me standards and GLEs. As implementation ideas and activities are presented and demonstrated, ways to convey this information to school administrators will be emphasized. "NAfME Update: What NAfME Is Doing for You,

**Cindy Price Svehla** is a veteran music educator of 28 years. For the past 25 years, she has been part of a successful band program in the Liberty, Missouri School District. During her tenure with Liberty Public Schools, Ms. Svehla has twice received the district's "Honoring Excellence Award" and has been nominated several times for "Who's Who Among American Teachers." Middle school and junior high bands under her direction have received many honors and awards. The Liberty ninth grade band under her direction performed for the Missouri Music Educators Association in 1990. At present, Cindy is an assistant director at Liberty North High School where she assists/teaches woodwind sectionals and private lessons. She also teaches five classes of middle level band and jazz band at South Valley Middle School.

"Cultivating the Clarinetist...You reap what you sow" (p. 32)

Techniques and strategies for the beginning and veteran instrumental teacher.

**Bridget Sweet**, Ph.D. is Assistant Professor of Music Education (Choral) at University of Illinois in Urbana-Champaign, Illinois where she teaches music education pedagogy, including choral methods and literature, middle school general music methods and graduate courses in music education. Dr. Sweet is a member of the Editorial Committee of the Music Educators Journal and an advisory board member of the International Journal of Education and the Arts. She has worked extensively with adolescent singers as a teacher, clinician and adjudicator. Her research interests include middle level choral music education, female and male adolescent voice change and diversity in music teacher education.

"Demystifying the Adolescent Choral Student" (p. 41)

This session has been designed to inform and empower teachers working with adolescent singers. Discussion will feature practical and applicable techniques for working with and meeting the needs of this student population. Emphasis will be placed on teacher awareness of key adolescent characteristics including the adolescent ego, the impact of emotional components of the adolescent choral student and the importance of choral teacher flexibility. Physiological changes that occur during male and female voice change will also be discussed, as well as selection of choral repertoire for changing voices and practical methods of accommodating voice changes within existing repertoire.

**Dr. Mallory Thompson** is the Director of Bands, Professor of Music and Coordinator of Conducting and Ensembles at Northwestern University. In 2003 she was named a Charles Deering McCormick Professor of Teaching Excellence. As the third person in the university's history to hold the director of bands position, Thompson conducts the Symphonic Wind Ensemble, teaches undergraduate and graduate conducting, and administers all aspects of the band program. December 2011 marked the release of Rising, her fourth compact disc with the Northwestern Symphonic Wind Ensemble on the Summit label. (complete bio located on page 79)

**Cheryl Eisele West** conducts the Indianapolis Children's Choir's (ICC) Indianapolis Youth Chorale (IYC), which consists of 98 auditioned singers from the surrounding area who perform both domestically and internationally. In addition to her work with the IYC, West is adjunct professor at Butler University Jordan College of Arts and the University of Indianapolis School of Music, teaching in the areas of music education, choral conducting, university choirs, studio piano and voice. She also supervises and mentors choral music education student teachers.

West's career of high school and collegiate teaching expands 30 years. A frequent clinician, adjudicator, presenter and guest conductor for All-State Honor Choirs, Showchoir Camps of America, school music festivals and competitions, state music conventions, conferences and community and church choirs, quality music education for every child continues to be West's driving passion.

- 5. perform or produce works in the fine and practical arts
- 6. apply communication techniques to the job search and to the workplace
- 7. use technological tools to exchange information and ideas

Goal 3: Students in Missouri public schools will acquire the knowledge and skills to recognize and solve problems.

- 6. examine problems and proposed solutions from multiple perspectives
- 7. evaluate the extent to which a strategy addresses the problem
- 8. assess costs, benefits and other consequences of proposed solutions

Goal 4: Students in Missouri public schools will acquire the knowledge and skills to make decisions and act as responsible members of society.

Students will demonstrate within and integrate across all content areas the ability to

- 1. explain reasoning and identify information used to support decisions
- 2. understand and apply the rights and responsibilities to citizenship in Missouri and the United States
- 3. analyze the duties and responsibilities of individuals in societies
- 4. recognize and practice honesty and integrity in academic work and in the workplace
- 5. develop, monitor and revise plans of action to meet deadlines and accomplish goals

#### **Tan-Tar-A Building Descriptions**

**EASTWINDS:** Go down Market Lane past all shops, down two short flights of stairs, proceed around corner instead of down next flight of stairs and go straight ahead. Eastwinds is the room just up a short set of stairs on the right, in the corner.




**CRYSTAL BALLROOM:** Go down Market Lane, past all shops, down three flights of stairs, to our Social Lobby. At the Social Lobby take the short flight of carpeted steps up to the Crystal Ballroom, which is on your left.

**DRAWING ROOM TERRACE:** Go down Market Lane past all shops, down three flights of stairs, to our Social Lobby. At the Social Lobby, take the short flight of steps down, past the Bowling Alley and Black Bear Lodge Restaurant entrance and proceed down the ramp. At the end of the ramp, turn right and the Drawing Room Terrace is straight ahead.

**NORTHWINDS AND SUITE G:** Take escalator or elevator from the Main Lobby up to the catwalk to Building E. Cross the catwalk to the 3rd level of Building E. Go left at Building E's main corridor and proceed out the side door into the stairwell where you will exit through the door on your left. Go across the road and into Building D, entering through the double glass doors on your left. Northwinds and Suite G are in Building D, next door to each other.

**AUDITORIUM:** The Auditorium is a building on the waterfront. Proceed down our main road, toward the marina and Arrowhead Pool. When walking toward these areas, you will see our playground. To the right of the playground is the Auditorium.

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
