#### **Music Teacher Shortage**

#### U.S. Department of Education, Teacher Shortage Area by State, June 2017

✓ 60 Missouri Counties reported a shortage of qualified music teachers available to fill the needed positions.

#### According to Higher Education Arts Data

✓ Average number of music teachers that leave the workforce is estimated at 11,000 annually.

#### **UMSL**

- ✓ Alternative Certification and Temporary Authorization rates are at an all-time high.
- ✓ We are graduating more students that come back to school to finish a master's degree with certification than are graduating with a bachelor's in certification.

St. Louis City School District has 8 schools with no music teacher. K-12 Music has the greatest shortage.

#### **MMEA Band Report**

#### **Conference News**

We had 73 ensemble applications. The panel chose one middle school, one band from class 3, two from class 4, four from class 5, one college ensemble, one community group, and one high school woodwind ensemble and one collegiate percussion ensemble.

#### **Clinicians/Clinics**

Alfred Music, Jupiter Instruments, and JW Pepper have graciously agreed to help sponsor Dr. Peter Boonshaft for our conference. He will be presenting two clinics on Thursday:

- 1. How We Teach Is As Important As What We Teach: 20 Ways To Energize Your Rehearsals
- 2. Warm-up and Ensemble Development Exercises that Work!

Dr. Timothy Oliver, Arkansas State University will be presenting a clinic entitled "Score Study for the Busy Band Director." He presented this clinic at AMEA and it was highly recommended to me by some Arkansas directors.

Becky Long, sponsored by Palen Music Center, will be presenting a clinic on tips and techniques to get our students to practice more effectively.

Jennifer Shenberger will be presenting a clinic on techniques for success in the solo and small ensemble room.

#### **Other News**

The Missouri Small Band Directors Association is moving forward on creating an All-State Large Ensemble Festival for those groups who will no longer be eligible to attend the MSHSAA sponsored event. There have been multiple offers by many directors offering to host the festival and overwhelming support for the creation of this event. It is currently in the planning stages but I am confident that a high quality festival will be the result of this endeavor.

## Choral VP Report Paula Martin

There were 54 choir recordings sent in. That number is down three from last year. I think that the quality of the performances, however, was at least as good, if not better overall. The panel chose:

- 3 collegiate ensembles (two mixed and one men's group) last year only two collegiate ensembles were selected.
- 1 Middle School (mixed ensemble) last year two middle school ensembles were selected, one female and one male
- 5 High school ensembles (1 mixed chamber choir, 2 women's ensembles, 2 mixed concert choirs)- last 6 high school groups were selected, two women's choirs and 4 mixed concert choirs)
- 1 Community ensemble (adult mixed choir) last year there were no community groups selected

The process was long! We began at 9:00 a.m. and finished just about 6:00 p.m. with only time out for a quick lunch that we had delivered in. I recommend again this year that the stipend be raised. The collegiate directors in particular surprised by the amount we offered.

### Jazz VP Report Ron Sikes

I'm excited for this year's conference! We little something for everyone. Our clinics will address big band articulations and style and jazz piano for non-pianists! In addition to clinics we have a high school jazz band, college jazz band and high school vocal jazz groups scheduled to perform

Jerry Tolson is professor of jazz studies and music education at the University of Louisville, where he is chair of the music education division, directs instrumental and vocal jazz ensembles and teaches jazz pedagogy, jazz style, jazz history, and African American Music classes. Jerry will be presenting "The Jazz Commandments: Guidelines for Successful, Authentic Swing Performance." The ultimate goal of this clinic is to provide useful tips for helping students understand jazz articulation and style and create an authentic swing style.

Phillip Dunlap is the Director of Education and Community Engagement for Jazz St. Louis (JSL), a not-for-profit organization dedicated to the thriving of jazz in America. Phil will be presenting a clinic on jazz piano. The clinic is geared towards directors with little-to-no background in jazz piano so the director will have more resources to help jazz piano students in a big band setting.

What would MMEA be without performances from fine ensemble from around the state? University of Missouri-St. Louis Jazz Ensemble, directed by Jim Widner, Grandview High School Jazz Orchestra, director by Charles Jakes, and Parkway Central High School Standard Time Vocal Jazz group will offer performances which will blow you away!

In addition to the fine clinics and performances already mentioned, I encourage you to learn more about the Missouri Association for Jazz Education (MOAJE). MOAJE will be sponsoring a jam session, a reading session, and All-State clinician, Byron Stripling! Do yourself a favor...visit one of his All-State rehearsals and take time to hear the performance of the All-State Jazz Ensemble!

### St. Louis Metro District #8 Keith Moyer

Quite possibly our greatest tradition is the facilitation of our Metro #8 Honor Ensembles. Our educators, communities, schools, families, and students have a history of assembling top-notch honor ensembles and leaving audiences in awe of their performance. Many of our students will go on to seat spots in the All-State Honor Ensembles and beyond. There is a strong musical tradition in our community as evidenced by the overwhelming support our students receive and I look forward to another great year of performances by the Metro 8 ensembles.

Currently, some of the finest educators in our area are working to facilitate auditions for these groups. A complete list of dates, audition materials, audition procedures, and registration information is provided on our website and I sincerely hope each of you will encourage your students to take an audition. It cannot be overlooked that the audition process is itself a time-honored tradition. It has withstood the test of time and the benefits your students will receive go way beyond whether or not they make the ensemble. I can think of no other activity that more prepares a student for success in a society requiring competitive interviews, exhaustive preparation, self-awareness, and continued personal growth.

For most of you reading this, the Metro 8 audition process is a tradition your school is very familiar with. Your programs have seated countless members over the years and your communities and families have celebrated these students. Your students rise through the ranks of your programs with their sights set on making these ensembles. Many will aspire to make the All-State ensembles or that college program they dream of being a part of. This is a testament to the program you run and the school you work within. I applaud your continued efforts and thank you for your service to music education and the students it benefits. With that being said, there are many schools in our district that are not involved in Metro #8 which means that the traditions we take for granted are completely foreign to many students within our larger community. 

### INFORMATION FOR CONTRIBUTORS- Missouri Journal of Music

### **Education**

The *Missouri Journal of Music Education* is a publication devoted to the needs and interests of the school and college music teachers of Missouri and of the nation. The editorial committee of the journal encourages submissions of original research pertinent to instruction in music of a philosophical, historical, quantitative or qualitative nature. In addition, reviews of literature that include a rationale/purpose, as well as conclusions and/or implications for research and/or practice, and suggestions for future research, will be considered.

**Submission Procedures.** Authors are invited to submit an abstract of 150 – 200 words and manuscript in a single .doc attachment to the editor via <u>silveyba@missouri.edu</u>. Authors are requested to remove all identifying personal data from submitted articles. Manuscripts submitted for review must not be previously published or under consideration for publication elsewhere.

Style. Manuscripts should conform to the most recent style requirements set forth in the *Publication Manual of the American Psychological Association* (APA, Sixth edition). Authors of non-quantitative papers may alternatively choose to adhere to *The Chicago Manual of Style*, or *A Manual for Writers of Term Papers, Theses, and Dissertations* (K. L. Turabian). Styles should not be mixed within the submission. The text should be double-spaced and use a 12-point font. All figures and tables should be submitted camera ready within the manuscript and designed so that they will fit with the page space of the journal (approximately 4.5 inches wide by 7.5 inches high) and use an 8-point or larger font size. To assure anonymity during the review process, no identifying information should be included in the submission.

**Review Procedures.** Three editorial committee members review submissions in a blind review process. Authors will normally be notified of the status of the review within two months. The editorial committee adheres to the Research Publication/Presentation Code of Ethics of the Music Education Research Council of NAfME: National Association for Music Education and the National Research Committee of the American Music Therapy Association.

**State Assessment Pass Rates.** Pass rates for the required assessments for preservice teachers were reported at the June State Board Meeting. At the present time, pass scores will remain the same. DESE is exploring raising pass rates for content areas with a higher than 90% pass rate.

**Video Explanations of MoPTA Tasks.** ETS has published video explanations of each task as a resource on the MoPTA website.

**Student Teaching Professional Development Plan.** At the request of school districts, the Professional Growth Plan has been renamed the Professional Development Plan. According to DESE, this is a required element of Student Teaching. It is explained in the MoPTA materials but is not required to be submitted to ETS or to DESE. Ed prep programs are inconsistent as to whether this is required. DESE has been advocating that school districts build upon this plan, however at this point, it appears that only a minimal number of school districts expect new teachers to arrive with this plan.

**Future Educational Needs of Missouri.** DESE and DHE are developing a task force of COE administrators and school districts to discuss teacher shortages and how to collaboratively address those needs.

### Advocacy Leadership Force (ALF) Report Fall 2017

**Standards Revision.** On March 21, the State Board of Education has directed DESE to convene two workgroups to review the Missouri Fine Arts Standards. A committee, made up of 32 educators will be charged with the task of reviewing and revising the existing expectations and revising the standards using the original Show-Me Standards will remain as an overarching framework. The requirement for the nomination processes will follow the requirements passed by the legislature. Most of the nominations have been submitted. The work on nominating is expected to begin soon. It is expected that different subcommittees will be formed to develop standards for each area (e.g. music, art, theater, dance).

**MSIP 6.** The Missouri School Improvement Program (MSIP) has been the primary accreditation process for school districts since 1990. The primary goals of the revision are to produce a plan that (a) articulates the state's expectations, (b) better distinguishes among strong and weak school districts, (c) empowers districts with greater local control and (d) promotes continous improvement and innovation. Over the summer several committees developed revisions for MSIP. A vision for incentivizing innovation, collaboration and personalization learning is driven revision; however the paramters of MSIP are limited by statutes in law. It is expected that a rule change will be published in October of these changes. Some important aspects of expected changes relevant for music education in the draft of the rule change are as follows.

- Academic Achievement MAP will remain the primary measure of academic achievement requiring meeting or exceeding state standards and improvement expetations overall and for subgroups.
- Systems and Processes. As part of the resource standards, 50 minutes of required instruction in music is retained as the elementary level. Middle School and Junior High will require access to music instruction. The 1,500 minutes required at the middle school level will be removed. These issues were discussed extensively by the Systems and Processs Workgroup, and compromise that would ensure access for all middle school students was unable to be reached. While no one disputes the importance of music in the discussion, the need for flexibility for districts, the important of student choice and the challenges of small districts were cited as important factors. Participating in public comment will be an important issue for us. It is also important for us to recognize that anything that is included in

MSIP is only enforceble if it is also in statute. There is no change to the fine arts graduation requirement. 750 students remains the maximum number of students that can be served per week by music teachers.

- Effective Educators and Instructional Practices Instructional Processes. The process standards will require educator evaluation system, professional development, written curriculum and assessments that align with state requirements.
- Climate and Culture. The climate and culture standards will require that curricular choices, co-curricular offerrings and extracurricular activities be aligned with the future success of all students and the mission and vision of the district.
- Leadership and Governance. The standards specifiy the responsibilities of school board and school leaders.
- Success-Ready Graduates. These standards remain under development but are moving toward a set of indicators at upper elementary, middle school entry, high school entry and high school exit that will attempt to track student readiness for career and citizenship.

Due to the complexity, it is now expected that the development of MSIP 6 will likely be a continue over a year and a half as the standards and indicatore are developed.

**ESSA Update.** The Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) was signed into law on December 10, 2015. ESSA reauthorizes the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965. The current version is primarily focused on ensuring civil rights and access for all students, particularly those afflicted by poverty, migration, neglected and delinquent youth and other factors limiting access. The state plan is due to the the US DOE by September 18. One reason that the state delayed submitting the plan to the fall was that changes were made to the submission template by the new administration and that DESE sees MSIP as a more primary driver that nESSA for improvement.

The state ESSA plan was available for comment between June 15 and July 15. Based on the comments revisions were to be made by August 1 and the governor has the opportunity to comment by August 15. The state plan did not address well roundness from the perspective of music or art in a substantial way. The references to Title II did not address specific aspects of arts, music or arts integration professional development. The approach to the use of Title IV is on enhancing online offerrings to ensure that students have access to rigorous course offerrings.

**State Board of Education.** The governor has recently nominated Melissa Gelner (Springfield) and Eddy Justice (Poplar Bluff) to the State Board.

**State Budget.** The 2018 budget signed by the governor cuts higher education by 9 percent and makes cuts to transportation. Projections for the next year do not look promising.

#### MMEA Report from Tom Tobias, Arts Education Director August 12, 2017

#### **Arts Standards Revision Update:**

Some, but not all nominations have been submitted by various groups. Efforts are taking place to move those groups into fulfilling their obligation and make their nominations so that the State School Board can make appointments.

One committee, made up of 16 K-5 educators and 17 6-12 educators will be charged with the task of reviewing the existing expectations and revising them. The original Show-Me Standards will remain as an overarching framework for new expectations.

Since the release of the National Core Arts Standards, the majority of states have revised their arts standards. For the most part, revised standards from other states follow the basic template of the National Core Arts Standards:

### **Create Perform Respond Connect**

11 Anchor Standards Common to All of the Arts

Discipline Specific Essential Questions and Enduring Understandings

K-12 Discipline Specific Standards/Expectations

Model Cornerstone Assessments That Define Proficient, Accomplished and Advanced Student Work.

At least one state has created design standards as a part of their arts standards that reflect the Massachusetts Institute of Technology Design Thinking template of empathize, define, and ideate, prototype, test. I think that this is a good idea because it helps keep the arts in any project based learning or STEAM approach to teaching.

According to HB 1490, DESE will stay out of any standards revision unless invited to be present as an advisor. It is expected that given the complexity of arts standards, especially within music education that ad hoc committees within specific arts disciplines will be formed to advise and help the committees with writing.

#### Missouri School Improvement Plan 6

Advisory committees were convened this summer to work on the revision of the current MSIP plan. It looks as though the new plan will include additional measures on how schools are evaluated by DESE. Music educators are encouraged to look for the release of a draft version of the new plan and provide commentary, specifically on any language in the plan that includes the arts. Arts educators also need to be wary of any language that makes it possible for a district to have anything less than a robust arts program.

### **National Assessment for Educational Progress**

Results of the 2016 NAEP Test in Visual Art and Music were released in April of 2017. Results indicate that nation-wide 63% of all 8<sup>th</sup> grade students took a music class in 2016. The national score on writing and listening test of knowledge and skills in music was 147 out 300 possible. Only two *schools* in Missouri were selected for the test. There are no state scores available, only regional trends. Generally, the Northeast region has the highest scores.

Missouri music educators are encouraged to explore the results of the 2016 NAEP Assessment and compare what they teach to what the NAEP expectations are for music learning. There are a number or released items on the NAEP website for you to explore.
